Oil company Shell's staff data leaked

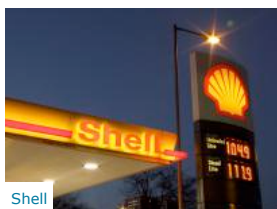

Information about 100,000 employees at Royal Dutch Shell has been leaked to human rights and environmental organisations. The details include e-mail addresses and telephone numbers, but not home addresses.

The British newspaper, *The Financial Times*, says Shell staff angry at the oil company's operations in Nigeria are thought to be behind the leaks. They are said to be calling for what they describe as a peaceful revolution within the company.

Shell says details from its complete address databank have been made public but is refusing to comment further. The company has launched an internal inquiry. Shell has recently sacked thousands of its staff.

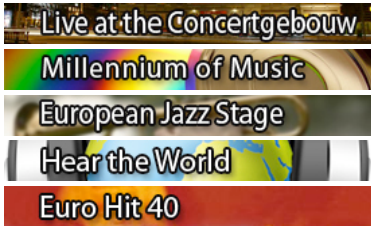
