

HITLER ENVOY TALKS WITH BRITISH OFFICIAL

Rosenberg Sees Under-Secretary for Foreign Affairs—Stays at Deterding Home.

LONDON, May 8.—Dr. Alfred Rosenberg, Chancellor Hitler's envoy, was received at the British Foreign Office today by Sir Robert G. Vansittart, Under-Secretary for Foreign Affairs. He asked for appointments with others in the government, but none has been arranged so far.

Dr. Rosenberg is officially here for the purpose of creating a better understanding between Hitlerite Germany and Great Britain. He made no demands at the Foreign Office, but he is understood to be particularly desirous of clarifying Chancellor Hitler's attitude on the MacDonald disarmament plan, in which connection it is possible that Dr. Rosenberg will meet Norman H. Davis of the United States tomorrow.

During the week-end Germany's special envoy stayed at Buckhurst Park with Sir Henri W. A. Deterding, head of the Royal Dutch Company. With Dr. Rosenberg's long-standing interest in Russia, it is assumed they discussed the Soviet oil monopoly. Sir Henry is bitterly hostile to the Soviet Government, owing to the confiscation of the Baku oil fields, which his companies owned.

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
